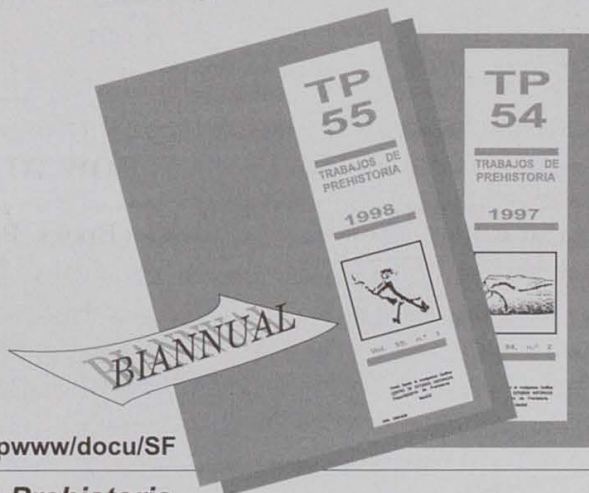

ENVIRONMENTAL ARCHAEOLOGY, THE JOURNAL OF HUMAN PALAEOECOLOGY (EA) is the new, peer reviewed journal published for the Association for Environmental Archaeology by Oxbow Books. **EA** aims to provide a forum for the myriad of sub-disciplines in environmental archaeology and, moreover, to encourage communication and integration of results between various specialists. **EA** seeks to publish a wide range of contributions in all fields of environmental archaeology from all regions of the world. Topics can range from methodology to synthesis to theory. Papers on new techniques, philosophical discussions, current controversies and suggestions on areas for new research, as well as conventional research papers are encouraged.

–THREE ISSUES OF EA ARE AVAILABLE NOW–

Volume 1: Fodder: Archaeological, Historical and Ethnographic Studies edited by Michael Charles, Paul Halstead and Glynis Jones. Fourteen papers from the Easter 1995 meeting of the Association for Environmental Archaeology at Sheffield addressing livestock feeding from prehistory through the 19th century. This is a central but often overlooked feature of Old World farming economies and this volume reflects the growing interest in this topic.

Volume 2: Nine articles on a variety of topics from fish bone assemblages on Orkney or wheat grain identification criteria, to animal hair finds in medieval ship culking and pine marten and other animals in Dinogad's smock.

Volume 3: Seasonality edited by Jan Peter Pals and Louise van Wigngaarden-Bakker. This volume features fifteen papers from the Autumn 1994 Conference of the Association for Environmental Archaeology at Zwartsluis, The Netherlands on the detection of seasonality in the archaeological record.

Volume 4: forthcoming late 1999 will feature articles on a variety of topics such as new data on Early Medieval flax cultivation, Coleoptera from Late Medieval smoke-blackened thatch, dental microwear in pigs, and a review of cereal and pulse domestication in south-west Asia. This volume also includes reviews of recent publications related to environmental archaeology.

ANTHROPOZOOLOGICA is a semi-annual European periodical created in 1984 to stimulate exchanges of research results and ideas among scientists studying the relationship between man and animal, from the origins down to modern times. Its aim is to promote the study of these relationships viewed as strong expressions of the history of cultures and societies in their natural environments.

The journal publishes original articles in French and English from all disciplines dealing with this topic, principally interdisciplinary syntheses, as well as book reviews. It contains bilingual scientific information concerning the relationships between man and animal (recent publications, meetings, academic theses...). It can also publish proceedings of colloquiums and thematic volumes.

ANTHROPOZOOLOGICA is published with the help of the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique. An interdisciplinary board of referees of twenty members of the international scientific community helps authors to improve their manuscripts. Accepted papers are published within 12 months of their submission. **ANTHROPOZOOLOGICA** is distributed in some twenty countries, mainly in Europe.

MAN AND ANIMAL, Society for Interdisciplinary research (association established in 1984) in the publisher of **ANTHROPOZOOLOGICA**. Every year, together with its general assembly, it organises international scientific meetings in France or another European country. The papers presented during these meetings may be published in the journal, either individually, or as proceedings of the meeting.

The last issue of **ANTHROPOZOOLOGICA** (n° 25-26, 1997) contains the **Proceedings of the 7th ICAZ Conference** held in Constance in September 1994. In this hard cover volume of 808 pages, 101 richly illustrated papers update the results of archaeozoology through the world. They are spread into six sections (Methods; America, Eastern Asia, Pacific; Old World Hunters and Gatherers; Postpalaeolithic Europe I; Postpalaeolithic Europe II Asia, Africa; Posters). This volume is 490 FF per copy + 53 FF for postage.
